Why does waste matter?

- Whether it's avoiding generating waste, keeping plastic out of our natural environment or reducing harm by managing waste better – waste matters
- Waste isn't just about litter and landfills; it's about how we use limited resources.
- How we create waste is connected to climate change as well as emissions from landfill, it takes a lot of energy to feed our 'take-makewaste' culture.
- Shifting towards 'rethink-reduce-reuse' actions can make a big difference.











What is the Waste Plan?

- The Waste Plan is shared between Nelson City Council and Tasman District Council, and it must be reviewed every six years.
- The Waste Plan identifies regional strategic priorities and what actions the Councils could consider to meet them.
- Councils are required by law to have a Waste Plan, and central government provides funding to implement some of its actions.

What's the national direction on waste?

- In March 2023, central government released Te Rautaki Para/ New Zealand Waste Strategy 2023
- Its vision is 'By 2050, Aotearoa New Zealand is a low-emissions, low-waste society, built on a circular economy'
- It prioritises actions that reduce waste in the first place reduce, reuse, recycling – before managing and disposing and recognizes the link with responding to the impacts of climate change










Key building blocks of the New Zealand Waste Strategy:



Reduce the resources being used and redesign to avoid producing waste Reduce, rethink, redesign Circular management Keep things in use for as long as possible, without significant reprocessing Reuse, repair, repurpose Process materials to make the same or Recycle, compost, different material of similar value when anaerobic digestion reuse is no longer possible Recover any remaining value, sustainably and without increasing Recover value emissions (eg, chemical recycling, renewable energy) For any truly residual waste, treat to remove or reduce potential harm Dispose before final disposal Least favoured option

Best option

The **circular economy** is about changing our take-make-waste approach and finding ways to 'design-out' waste and create materials that can be captured and used again and again.

The waste hierarchy illustrates the best and least favoured options to reduce and manage waste. The top layers of the waste hierarchy represent a circular approach to managing materials. The layers below the yellow line is when something needs to managed as waste.









The New Zealand Waste strategy has three targets for its 'Phase One' by 2030:

- Reduce the amount of material going into the waste management system by 10% per person
- Reduce the amount of material needing final disposal by 30% per person
- Reduce biogenic methane emissions by 30%









WASTE IN OUR REGION:

We've done a snapshot of the current situation with waste, including a gap analysis and forecast of future demand – we think these are the issues we need to consider (in no particular order):

- Responding to climate change
- Cost of disposing and recycling
- Strengthening partnerships between Council and iwi
- Shift to a local circular economy
- Protecting our natural environment
- Improving diversion of resources from landfill, for example building and organic waste
- Protecting public health & safety
- Improving access to data
- Improving disaster waste management
