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INTRODUCTION

This document contains photographs, quotes and extracts from Papers Past & Nelson Photo News or other sources found online, as well as photographs shared by locals with Save the Maitai Inc.

These images and quotes illustrate just some examples of the cultural heritage of the Maitai Valley and its cultural values to Nelsonians from 1843 up to the present day.

As a pākeha compiler, I have not attempted to present a Māori world-view.

These snippets of history are to some extent grouped by theme however they are also in approximate chronological order.

LOOKING BACK IN 1915

THE PEOPLE AND THE MAITAI.

Up to the time of Mrs Richardson's departure for England, picnicking or camping **up the Maitai** was not much in vogue, there being no roads or bridges." And proceeding the Commissioner says :—

Subsequently the Maitai Valley came to be used as a picnic and camping resort, and in about 1898 roads were formed and bridges erected, partly out of the funds of the local bodies, and partly out of moneys raised by public subscription; and thereafter the valley became largely used by citizens, for the most part on the river banks on the Richardson estate, with the express or tacit consent of the tenants. During the same period Denne's Hole and Sunday Hole became largely used for swimming and bathing generally, though there is evidence to show that for many years the Maitai has been used for swimming, and in particular Denne's Hole was used by the school boys for learning to swim, under the supervision of the teachers.

PICNICS, SWIMMING AND SPORTS

1861: Wesleyan Sunday School Picnic

*"...in the Maitai Valley, upwards of 300 children, with their parents and friends, ... enjoyed themselves..."*¹

*"... Caledonian Society annual gathering in the Richardson's paddock, Maitai valley, ... there must have been nearly 3000 people on the ground during the day..."*³

1885: The Scene of Sports is a Very Pleasant One

THE MAITAI SPORTS.—The Maitai annual sports will take place in Mr Newport's large paddock in the Maitai Valley on Friday next, and with the very attractive programme the attendance will in all probability be very large indeed. After a procession, in which the cricketers in fantastic attire will take part, there will be a costume cricket match; and the general sports will include horse racing and the events usual at athletic sports. The scene of the sports is a very pleasant one, the river flowing round the greater portion of the paddock, and a footbridge will be erected for the convenience of the public.

1892: School Swimming Races at Dennes Hole and Sunday Hole

PICTURESQUE BEAUTIES OF MAITAI

1843

*"...an exploration trip up the Maitai. ... they describe the beauties of their journey. .. kakas and canaries are numerous as well as most of the smaller species of birds. . . . The banks of the river are here and there adorned with a fine shrub bearing a profusion of blossom of a vermillion colour. ."*⁵

1878: Few Places Can Beat the Maitai Valley For Picturesqueness

*"There are few places, however, that for picturesqueness can beat the Maitai Valley, and that alone proves an attraction to many. Yesterday was a perfect day, and the holiday appeared to be enjoyed to the full by all those who visited the grounds..."*⁶

1896: A PLACE OF RESORT SUCH AS NO OTHER TOWN IN NZ POSSESSES

"...Nelson has at present little to attract the tourist or holiday-makers from a distance, but it is only necessary to improve the road up the Maitai Valley, and it would have at its door a place of resort, such as no other town in New Zealand possesses,"

1911: One of the Prettiest Rivers to be Seen

Almost at one's feet lies the town, many of its homes simply embowered in green, while at the back of it the Maitai, surely one of the prettiest rivers to be seen, flows on its tortuous way to the sea, crossed by an endless number of

1897: PREMIER OF NEW ZEALAND UNDERSTOOD VALUE OF THE MAITAI VALLEY

Sir Richard SEDDON could see the existing and future value of the Maitai Valley in 1897.⁷ He wrote:

Dear Sir,—I am deeply grateful to the citizens of Nelson for their hearty congratulations on the safe arrival of myself, Mrs Seddon and family from the Mother Country, and I am also under great obligations to yourself, Messrs Rout and Baigent for the honour done by coming personally to present the communication. I am very pleased indeed to hear that the attractions of the environs of your beautiful city have been so much improved by the Rocks Road, now nearing completion. The project to open up the Maitai Valley as a tourist resort is most commendable, and will prove advantageous, not only to your district but to the whole colony. As you are well aware my time between this and the coming session will be entirely taken up by public business, so that I shall not be able to visit Nelson prior to that date. Later on and as soon as I can do so, I shall be pleased to comply with the request to deliver a lecture on my visit to the Mother Country. It is very pleasing to know that I still retain the goodwill and esteem of the people of your beautiful city.

1896: ROAD NEEDED TO 'FAVOURITE RESORT'

"...So many visitors to Nelson would find their way up the Maitai for a day's outing if there was any means of getting up this interesting and pretty ... it being quite a favourite resort..."

1899: Demand for Road Access to Nelson's 'Ruggedly Picturesque' Resort

"... until the road is mended, it is to be feared that the attractions of the Maitai Valley will not be availed of ...

... one of the most ruggedly picturesque resorts near Nelson is perforce neglected because of the absence of means of comfortable and easy access...

It is to be deplored that such characteristic country as the Maitai Valley, so near the city, should be neglected by tourists simply because the County Council will not or cannot expend a small yearly sum for road maintenance ...

... a pleasure resort unique in its attractions for picnics and camping – within an hour's drive from the centre of the city, and with a rugged grandeur that grows into one's soul and haunts the memory – the matter is of importance to the city, ...

Hundreds ... use the valley for picnic and camping purposes; ...⁸

until the road is mended, it is to be feared that the attractions of the Maitai Valley will not be availed of to any great extent by means of vehicles, though the temporary bridges have proved a great boon to all who like a pleasant walk. The condition of the road is a disgrace to the County Council and to the city; and, to show how one of the most ruggedly picturesque resorts near Nelson is perforce neglected because of the absence of means of comfortable and easy access, it may be pointed out that when the Governor was here he was not taken on the Maitai road for a drive. It was very wise to preserve the Viceroyal equilibrium and good temper by choosing the smooth roads to the Waimeas; but none the less it is to be deplored that such characteristic country as the Maitai Valley, so near the city, should be neglected by tourists simply because the County Council will not or cannot expend a small yearly sum for road maintenance. 1902: Who should Pay for Maitai Road Upkeep?

MAITAI CAMPING GROUNDS.

All who love and admire the beautiful Maitai Valley, the noble pleasure-inheritance of Nelson, will be interested in the circumstance that a comparatively rare land sub-division into small and cheap lots has just been made. It will be seen by advertisement that about 15 acres, recently the freehold of Mr Newport, jnr., have come into the market in convenient acre sections, and from personal knowledge we can say that the area contains a large proportion of the few remnants of native bush and fern yet left within easy access of the city in the Maitai Valley. The locality is well-known to all who seek the reaches of the Maitai beyond Smith's. It is just about a mile and a half beyond Mr Smith's place, and starting a little below a bend of the river, the property curves round by both banks of the stream, including both hillside and flat land. With a few exceptions all the lots have full frontages to the river, with convenient spots for the erection of camping whares, while each section retains a share of lovely native bush and fern, the maiden-hair and the todea—of which the famous "Prince of Wales' feather" is one variety—growing in luxurious abundance. The property is just about six miles from town and the

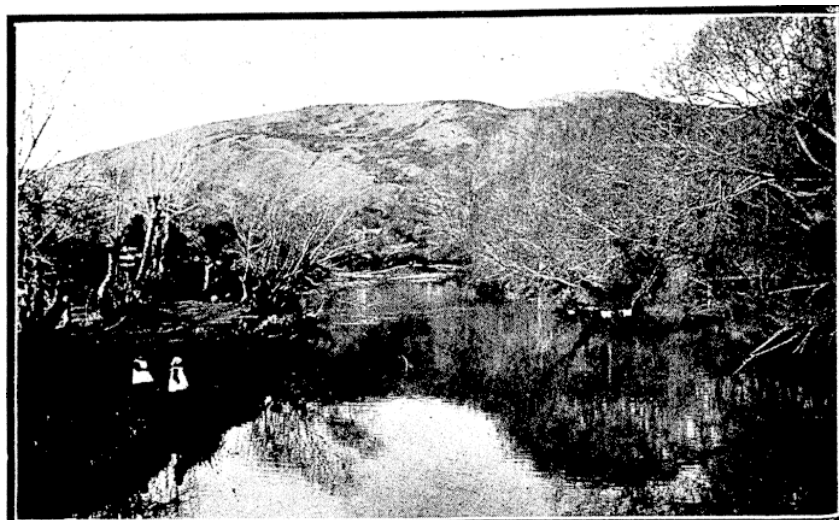

1911: an Asset of very great Value to Nelson - Reserve wanted for Posterity

“There was in the Maitai as a scenic and water reserve an asset of very great value to Nelson, but if the public were to be excluded, its value would be greatly diminished.”

1911: Public Meeting Held by Council in support of Acquiring Reserve Land

A long article was published discussing the Council’s intention to purchase reserve land and how that could be done.¹²

1912: Funding Sought from Central Government for ‘Most Attractive Holiday Resort’

“For generations the Valley has been the recreation ground for the children of the district, and by far the most attractive and popular of our holiday resorts...”¹³

1914: PETITION FROM 801 PEOPLE REQUESTS CONTINUED EFFORT TO ACQUIRE PUBLIC RECREATION LAND

A petition signed by 801 ratepayers was presented to the City Council last evening by Cr. Wilkens praying that the Council would continue its efforts to acquire certain lands in the Maitai Valley for public recreation purposes. On the motion of Cr. Wilkens, seconded by Cr. Webley, it was resolved that the petition be received and handed to the City Solicitor.

And here the graceful tree-ferns grow, And native flowerets sweetly blow, While scented shrubs their fragrance throw Along the Maitai valley.

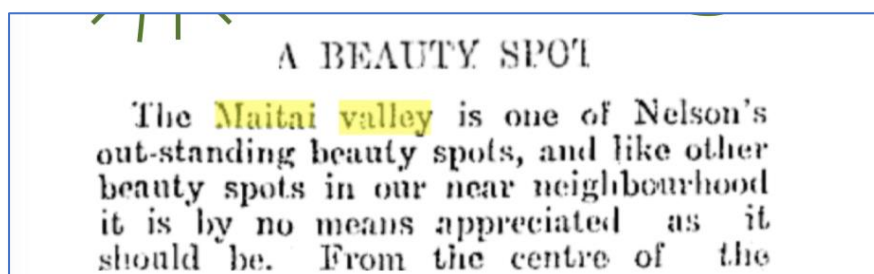
Here, all unnoted, man may dwell In blest contentment's golden spell, With little e'en to buy and sell, Along the Maitai Valley.

Here pillowed up in soft repose, Removed from weary cares and woes, How gently could life's evening close, Along, the Maitai Valley.

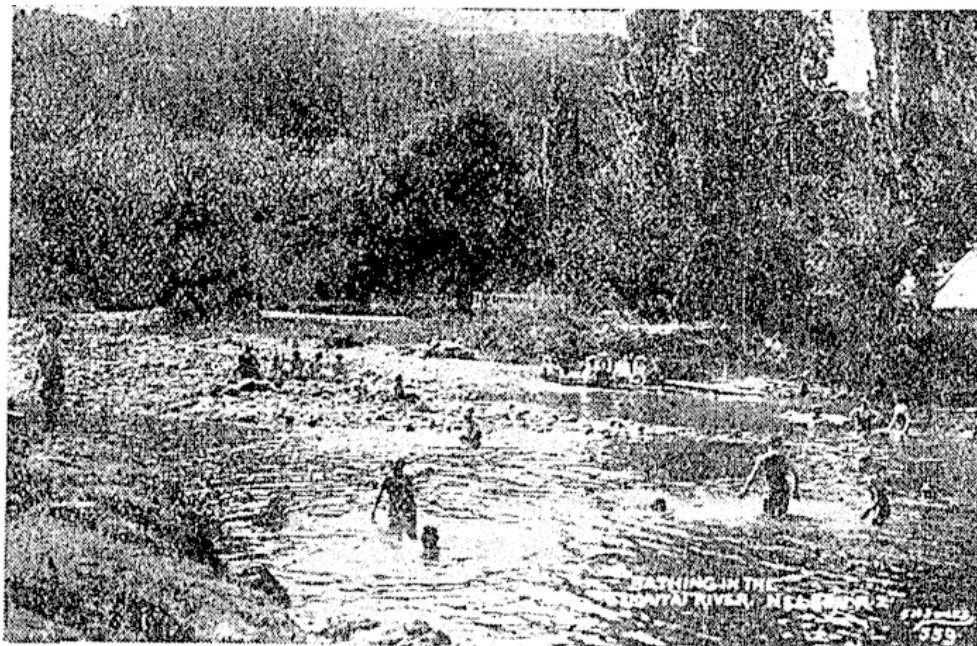
Here far removed from war's alarms, May I reside, in Peace's arms And sleep at last amidst thy charms, Fair, winding, Maitai Valley.

CITY COUNCIL'S ATTITUDE

A suggestion that the City Council and the Waimea County Council make an effort to have a bridge built at Sunday Hole ford in the Maitai Valley was made by the Mayor (Mr G. L. Page) at last night's meeting of the City Council.

The Mayor said he would like to see the City Council and the County Council combine in erecting the bridge over the ford. City people used the Maitai Valley road more than country people. Visitors to the valley frequently met trouble in crossing the ford, and campers became trapped in the valley if rain was experienced. He moved that the Waimea County Council be written to suggesting that a bridge be erected and that the county and city engineers confer and report on the estimated cost of the work.

Councillor S. A. Gibbs seconded the motion. He said the Maitai Valley offered a handy outlet for city people but they were largely precluded from using it with the ford in its present state.

The motion was carried.

Sunday Hole Ford.—Your executive has given this matter consideration and has participated in deputations to the Nelson City Council and Waimea County Council, in an endeavour to have this ford bridged, thus giving quick and easy access to the Maitai Valley, which is undoubtedly one of Nelson's outstanding beauty spots.

The crowd numbering 75 then adjourned to the bathing hole where a 30 lb eel has been seen. After persuading the eel with a bucket full of blood he did not make his appearance. The crowd after waiting till 10.30 p.m. decided to adjourn to bed after a strenuous day.

Best of all were the .. games; they are far more interesting and exciting when playing out-of-doors amongst the trees..."²⁰

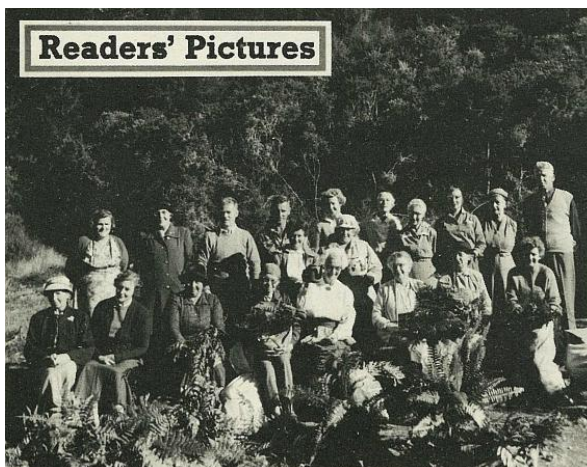

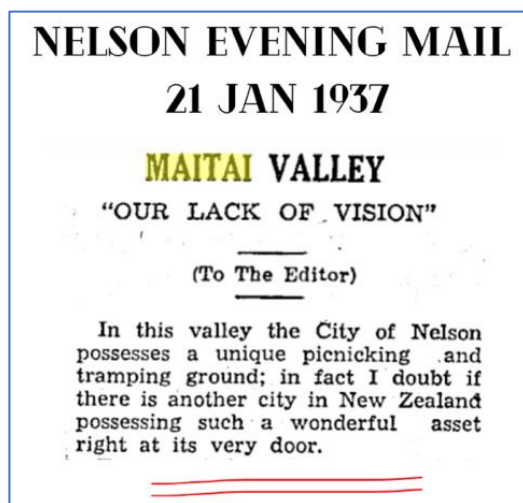

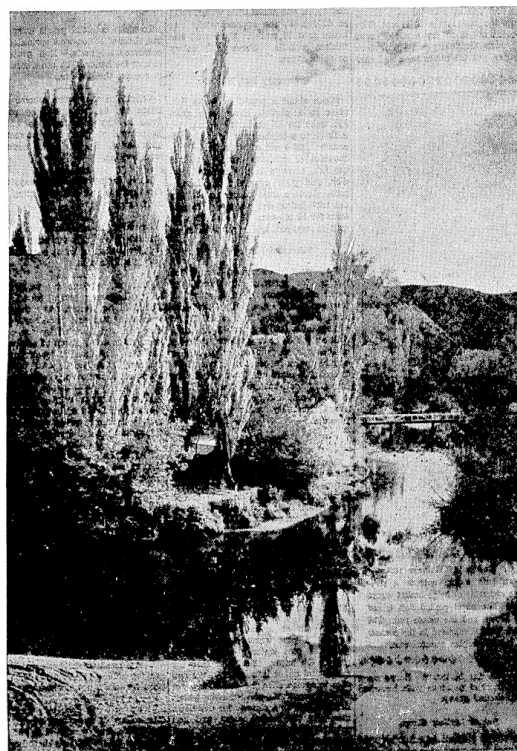

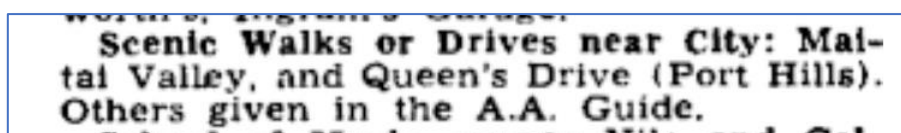

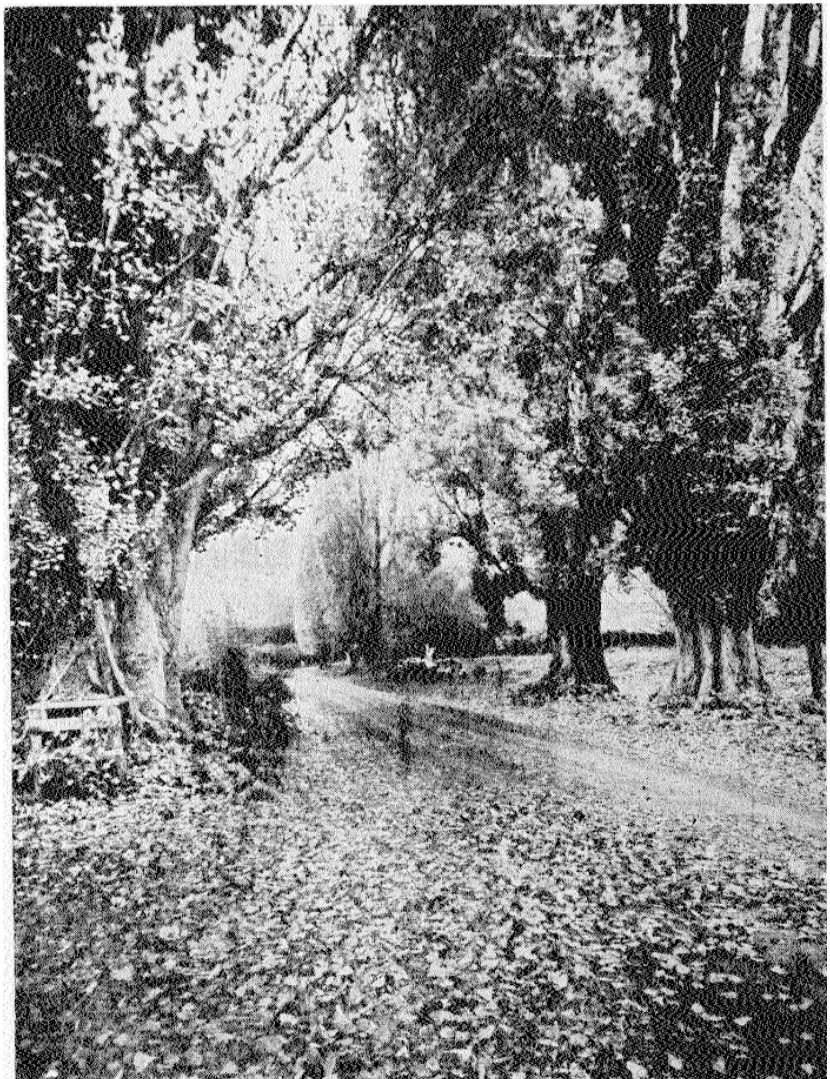

PROPOSED BRIDGE - PUBLIC SUBSCRIPTION LIST OPENED

"The condition of the Sunday Hole Ford ..., has prevented many motorists from visiting the beautiful Maitai Valley.

It is generally accepted that Nelson is fortunate in having such a delightful spot right at its back door, and the only drawback to full advantage being taken of it by members of the public generally, has been the bad access.

Several attempts have been made in the past to get a suitable bridge erected over Sunday Hole Ford but without success as apparently the necessary finance has not been available.

It is considered that many hundreds of Nelson people will be only too willing to make a subscription, either small or large, to this object which will be the means of making available to the people of the city and district one of nature's most delightful spots.

The city already owns a splendid reserve in the valley and unless some better means of access are provided, very little use can be made of it."

1940: 31 DEC. Y.M.C.A. TOURING PARTY VISIT TO NELSON DISTRICT

"... a tour of the Nelson district organised under the Y.M.C.A. Group Travel Scheme, a party of 30 young Wellington men and women ... left Wellington on Christmas Eve, and spent two days visiting places of interest in Nelson, their itinerary including a trip up the Maitai Valley on Boxing Day.

1945: SEEK THE SILENT COUNTRY (A LETTER TO CHILDREN)

Dear Boys and Girls,

—Alice just stood and gazed. It seemed wrong even to breathe.

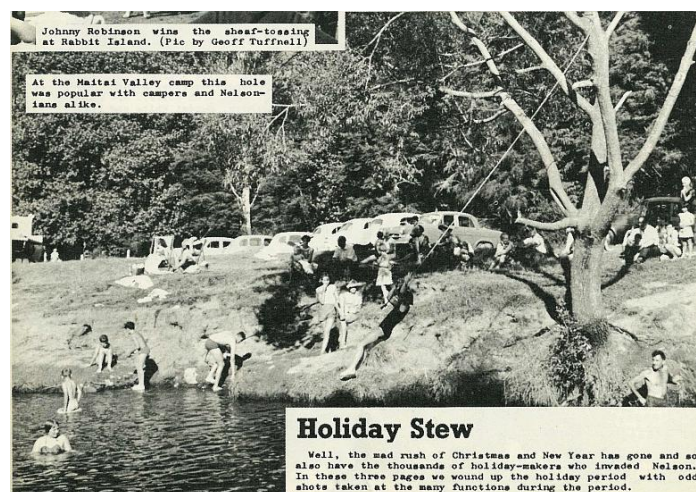

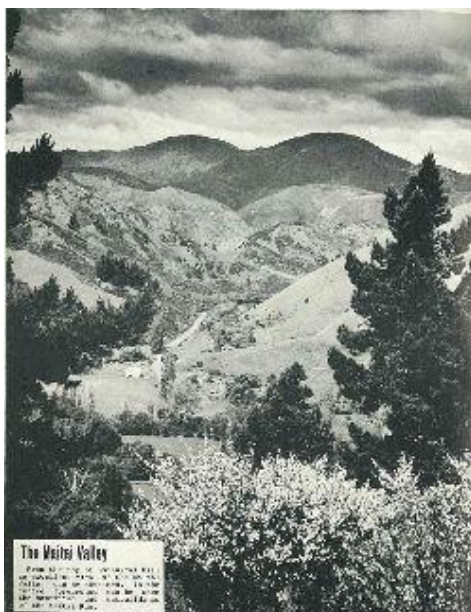

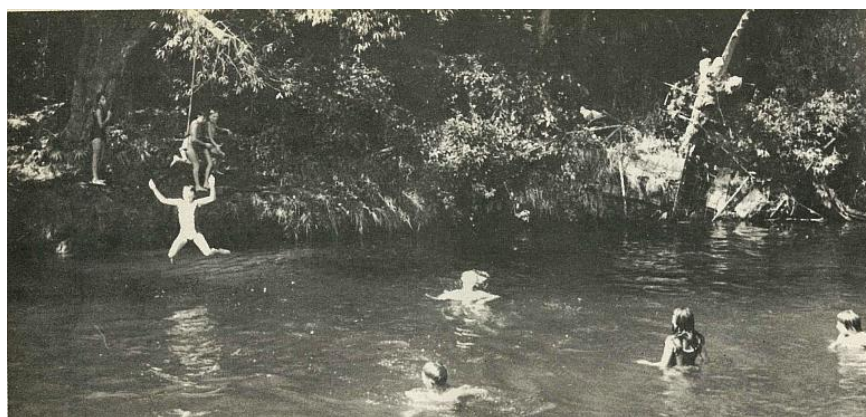

Centre of New Zealand Walk

What is it with Nelson? First game of rugby, centre of New Zealand...are we just showing off, or can we truly make these claims to fame? It's a 'Yes and No' answer, and one that you can learn about with a pleasant walk that also gives you a view of the city and coastline, taking you into Nelson's leafy Maitai River valley.

Find the Botanics Reserve, set aside by the early settlers, at the end of Hardy Street. An interpretation panel, shaped like rugby ball and goal posts, will tell you all about the history of the playing field.

Centre of New Zealand

The Centre of New Zealand on Botanical Hill is one of Nelson's most popular walks. The starting point is the Botanical Reserve, over a footbridge from the end of Hardy Street, or you can start at the Nelson Visitor Information Centre and follow the Maitai Walkway to the Hardy Street footbridge. Take a look at the interpretive panel at the bottom of the hill for some views of Nelson over the last century, and the history of this 'Village Green'.

To reach the Centre of New Zealand will take 20-60 minutes, depending on your age, speed and fitness. The main track is suitable for sturdier push chairs and buggies. At the top take a seat, enjoy the stunning view and pick out the features of Nelson's geography from the information panels. You can go downhill on one of the other tracks on the Botanical Hill, or opt to head along the hillside to Walters Bluff. A good summer option is to take your togs, walk down the eastern side of the hill to Branford Park, have a swim at Black Hole and take the Maitai Track back to your starting point.
